Boherduff Bridge (MO-N17-012.00), County Mayo

Dear Mr. O'Malley,

The Department is in receipt of your email dated 6th April 2021 in respect of Boherduff Bridge (MO-N17-012.00), Co. Mayo and has reviewed the Natura Impact Statement (NIS) referred to the Minister in this regard. The Department notes that the site is hydrologically linked to Lough Carra/Mask Complex Special Area of Conservation (SAC 001774), 53km downstream.

Matters related to Appropriate Assessment

The Department considers the assessment carried out in the NIS to be satisfactory and notes the mitigation measures proposed to ensure that the proposed project will not have an adverse effect on the integrity of any European site alone or in combination with other plans or projects. The Department advises that these measures be fully incorporated into the project at implementation phase, and that they must be carried out in full as part of project implementation.

General Ecological Concerns

The Department notes that the proposed works will be carried out between July 1st to Sept. 30th inclusive. The Department highlights that this is within the nesting period for

birds (1st March to 31st August). The Department recommends that nest searches are carried out prior to commencement of works.

It is important to highlight that the Grey Wagtail (Red listed Bird of Conservation Concern in Ireland (BoCCI)) nests within river banks and under bridges. Kingfisher (Annex I species under the EU Birds Directive and Amber-listed BoCCI) breed in vertical banks along streams and rivers.
