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### 1.0 CONFLICTS OF INTEREST

#### 2.0 COMMITTEE UPDATES

#### Strategy Committee

The Chairman reported that the following matters were considered by the Committee:

- National Cycle Network The Committee received an update in relation to the development of a five-stage plan, to be finalised in July. The plan envisages a comprehensive network around Ireland, including Northern Ireland, which will integrate with Greenways. A project governance Board has been set up. Stakeholder engagement commenced in April and public consultation starts later this month. It is intended to deliver 3500km of cycleway to interlink approximately 3 million people.
- Blended working TII adapted very quickly to remote working when necessitated by the
  pandemic and feedback on this has been sought from staff. 86% said remote working was easy,
  60% find it more productive and 144 staff would like to work 3+ days at home. DPER has
  developed a policy for the entire civil service. TII is now obliged to develop its own policy and is
  conducting a role suitability assessment for blended working to develop a five-pillar plan in line
  with the DPER framework.
- Research calls by TII This process takes place across the whole organisation with a screening
  process in place to identify suitable research projects for advancement. There are 8 research
  projects ongoing at present following a research call in 2021 with a budget of 3.1 million. A
  research call has now issued for 2022.
- Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) The Assurance and Performance Reporting Manager
  presented to the Committee on proposed indicators for 2022. There are 10 KPIs already in place
  with capacity for up to 17/18 in total. The Committee will look at this again as time did not
  permit full consideration of this topic.

#### Audit and Risk Committee:

The Chairman reported that the following matters were considered by the Committee:

- The Committee considered work advanced since the last meeting to update the risk reporting process, including the introduction of inherent and residual risk ratings on the ERR, risk trends and a summary of the top five enterprise level risks. The ERR risk rating exercise will continue through April and May and work on heat mapping will also be progressed. Time horizons for risk trending was discussed by the committee and this will be considered by the corporate risk manager and the executive. The ARC Chairman commended the work to date.
- The Committee reviewed a Treasury update and a Toll Road Update. The committee considered transitional issues in tolling processes and impacts of the pandemic, resulting losses to TII and the manner in which losses can be recouped from contractors. This matter will come back to the committee.
- The Committee discussed audit reports, including a review of security controls in which no recommendations were made. The committee noted the good work in this regard.
- The Committee received an ICT update on the new tool to be rolled out in TII for phishing simulations and updates.
- ARC training will take place in May and all Board members and executive are welcome to participate.

	Derek Brady and Helen Hughes presented NR2040, TII's investment strategy for the national road network, to the Board. The finalisation of the document has been in abeyance since 2019 awaiting finalisation of the DoT investment framework for the transport sector, NIFTI, which has now been completed. National Roads 2040 will now go out to stakeholder consultation. Following Q&A, the Board <b>endorsed</b> National Roads 2040.

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	Repair of Crash-Damaged Light Rail Vehicles	Delays to Transdev's repair of two damaged trams have been a concern for TII. TII escalated the issue to Transdev senior management in Q3/2021.	Repair arrangements have been finalised with the expectation that tram 3001 will return to service in January 2023 and tram 3003 in late 2023 or early 2024. TII will continue to monitor progress.
	Impact of Oil Price Volatility on Bitumen Prices	The current severe volatility in the price of oil and energy is having a significant impact on bitumen prices worldwide. In Ireland difficulties are compounded that there is no provision for indexation in the CWFM short form contract.	The CEO raised this matter at his recent appearance before the Joint Oireachtas Committee. Separately DOT made submissions to DPER in April seeking the introduction of price indexation for the duration of the current volatility. A response is awaited.
	Safety	There were no reportable accidents in the period.	
	Environmental Policy & Compliance	The EU Commission has taken a case against Ireland for failing to set site-specific conservation objectives (SCCOs) for 140 out of Irelands 423 European sites. The absence of SCCOs for these sites may have implications for the planning and delivery of MetroLink, Luas Finglas, Active Travel, Greenways and national roads projects.
